Greetings:

The onset of Covid-19 changed the lives of everyone in our community. The Kent County Sheriff's Office saw a drop in most all areas of crime. The normal traffic enforcement and proactive policing was dramatically reduced for the safety of the community and employees. We continued to provide 24-hour service and handled any incident we were called for. Although we were happy to see the reductions, we realize 2020 will most likely not be repeated and we are prepared to move forward and continue to provide the professional policing you have come to expect.

We are very proud of the level of service which the Kent County Sheriff's Office delivered to the citizens of the County during 2020. We are dedicated to maintaining a safe and secure environment for the citizens of Kent County. Statistics alone, however, do not tell the full story of our accomplishments. We have made significant progress in many areas which demonstrate our commitment to our vision:

The Kent County Sheriff's Office is a first-class law enforcement agency, delivering superior service to the citizens of Kent County.

<u>Law Enforcement Accreditation</u> In 2003 the Kent County Sheriff's Office became the first Eastern Shore Sheriff's Office to achieve accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). Your Sheriff's Office remains in compliance with more than 464 law enforcement "best practices." We now proudly display the CALEA logo on our uniforms and marked vehicles. In March, 2020, the Kent County Sheriff's Office received their sixth Certificate of Accreditation.

Kent County Narcotics Task Force The Task Force is comprised of Kent County Sheriff's Office, Maryland State Police, Chestertown Police Department and Maryland Natural Resources Police. In 2019, thirty-five (35) search and seizure warrants were executed resulting in thirty-four (34) arrests for possession or distribution of narcotics. In 2020, forty (40) search and seizure warrants were executed resulting in twenty-five (25) arrests for possession or distribution of narcotics.

Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Team In March 2009, the Kent County Sheriff's Office entered into a partnership with the Maryland State Highway Administration's Motor Carrier Division to enable KCSO Deputies to perform routine commercial vehicle enforcement inspections based on the North American Standard (NAS Standard). During 2019, KCSO Deputies performed 303 CMV inspections that resulted in 160 violations. At the conclusion of 2020, eight (8) Kent County Sheriff's Office Deputies had earned their certification through the Maryland State Police Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division to perform routine commercial vehicle enforcement safety inspections. During 2020, KCSO Deputies performed 52 CMV inspections that resulted in 29 violations.



UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING – UCR

The Maryland UCR Program is one component of the State's Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS). It establishes a method to collect, evaluate and process uniform statistical data on statewide crime. The Maryland UCR Program provides a means to consolidate the relevant data into a statewide report that can be provided to state, local and federal government agencies. The UCR Program collects statistics on the number of offenses known to law enforcement.

<u>Part I Crimes</u> include murder and nonnegligent homicide, rape (legacy & revised), robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, larceny-theft, and arson to be reported to the UCR Program. These offenses were chosen because they are serious crimes, they occur with regularity in all areas of the country, and they are likely to be reported to police.

<u>Part II Crimes</u> are "less serious" offenses and include: Simple Assaults, Forgery/Counterfeiting, Embezzlement/Fraud, Receiving Stolen Property, Weapon Violations, Prostitution, Sex Crimes, Crimes Against Family/Child, Narcotic Drug Laws, Liquor Laws, Drunkenness, Disturbing the Peace, Disorderly Conduct, Gambling, DUI.

<u>Commercial Vehicle Enforcement</u> January 2020 – December 2020

For the 2020 year, the Kent County Sheriff's Office had eight (8) Deputies certified to perform Level III inspections of Commercial Motor Vehicles based on the North American Standard (NAS). In order to retain the certification, each Deputy is required to conduct a minimum of thirty-two (32) Level III inspections in a one (1) year period. The Sheriff's Office maintained a total of eight (8) Deputies certified to conduct Level III inspections during 2020.

These numbers do not include passengers that were arrested for criminal offenses or warrants.
